

From the Churchwardens

CHURCH SERVICES ARE RESUMING

After careful consideration of the Covid 19 data and information released by the government we are thrilled to be able to reopen the church for services from the 14th March 2021, Mothering Sunday.

The PCC, in our deliberations to ensure that the church is a Covid 19 safe environment, have taken account of the facts that the number of people vaccinated is rapidly increasing whilst the number of cases of Covid 19 are decreasing. We are confident that we have reached the point where we can safely conduct services of worship once again.

Our intention is to manage the reopening of the Church incrementally so we can maintain a review of our risk assessments and re-introduce our programme of services in a controlled and gradual manner.

We will re-introduce the 10 o'clock service on each Sunday starting on 14th March, Mothering Sunday. This date was selected on the merits of the Covid 19 scientific data provided by the government, however it is very fitting that it coincides with Mothering Sunday, a special day for us all.

Centuries ago, it was considered important for people to return to their home or 'mother' church once a year. So, each year in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their 'mother' church - the main church or cathedral of the area. Inevitably the return to the 'mother' church became an occasion for family reunions when children who were working away returned home.


God works in mysterious ways. I believe that it is God's Will that the Parish Church of Redcar, Saint Peters, opens its doors to give the opportunity for all that are able to return to their local mother church can do so on this special occasion. God welcomes prayer and worship from wherever you are and whatever your circumstances, so please only return to church once your circumstances are right for you. The ministry team will continue to make services, prayers and worship available through the internet and social media so please avail yourself of these opportunities.

The Archdeacon of Cleveland, the Ven. Dr. Amanda Bloor, will be presiding over the service on Mothering Sunday celebrating this marvellous day.

We will maintain our Covid 19 precautions of: wearing face coverings; sanitizing hands; maintaining social distancing; sitting apart from each other; one way system in and out of church; enhanced church cleaning regime and not gathering before and after the service. This is particularly important to ensure the safety of us all throughout this pandemic.

O Lord, our God, we give you thanks and praise your greatness. We praise your mighty works to the whole world. We praise you for your wonderful deeds. Your power is limitless, your wisdom is unparalleled, your grace is overwhelming, your love is never failing.

Reader's Ramblings—A Reflection for March

This month will see the first anniversary of the start of the very first lockdown. Twelve months ago, we were

concerned about the rising numbers of people contracting Covid-19 and didn't know what the long-term effects of the virus might be. Children in schools were becoming more anxious at the news (I was on a teaching placement at the time and some of them were definitely worried) and many teachers were wanting to know what the plans were going to be so appropriate preparations could be made. In church, we had been in the position of having to make decisions about the distribution of communion and the sharing of the peace.

Schools now are in the position of preparing for a return of all pupils from 8th March. Churches (and other places of worship) are open, closed, or somewhere in between, depending on the decisions made by the people who have responsibility for the congregations.

Twelve months on, a lot has changed. There are several vaccinations available, and they are being rolled out globally. One will be made not too far from here.

Understandably we are still a bit anxious about the pandemic, especially with the discovery of the new variants. But compared to where we were at the start of March last year, we're in a very different place.

We are both hopeful for the future, for the roadmap that has been laid out for the easing of lockdown, should the necessary conditions be met. But we are also exhausted. (I know I am!) In a way, it feels like the last twelve months have been a continuation of last year's season of Lent.

So what can we do now? Acknowledge our exhaustion. We do ourselves a disservice if we try and say everything is all right when it isn't. The only person we

are tricking is ourselves. Jonah tried to run away from God, and (rather spectacularly) failed. But the story of Jonah tells us much more than just about one man trying to run away from God. Jonah knew what he was doing was wrong, and knew how to end the storm that had come upon him and the boat he was in. The men in charge of the boat didn't want to throw Jonah overboard, but Jonah insisted. And then, God sent the big fish, where Jonah was kept for three days, before being spat out on the shore near Nineveh.

Likewise, Jesus spent three days in the ground. That is what is meant when in the Gospels Jesus talks about the sign of Jonah (or the sign of Jonas). The difference is that Jonah was spending the three days in a fish and being given the chance to think about his actions and what he'd done that was against God's wishes. Jesus, by comparison, was dead. There are now narratives that talk of the harrowing of hell, saying that Jesus went down to hell to release the souls there who hadn't believed God, but this is not specified in the Gospel accounts.


While we (in this life) will never know what happened in those three days in the tomb, we do know that Jesus knows what it is like to be exhausted as a result of current events. Jesus lived through many trials and tribulations, and while a pandemic wasn't one of them, certainly the Roman occupation of Jewish territory would have been a cause of stress and anxiety for the Jews.

This year, we will be able to have an Easter celebration in church. It may echo that first Easter, with the disbelief that it is finally, actually, happening. But just like that first Easter, it will happen. And the events of Easter this year will too unfurl slowly, like a flower coming into bloom. But soon after, the flame of hope, just like the flames of Pentecost, will spread out and bring joy to all our hearts.





To be like you, to love like you, to heal brokenness and restore wholeness in families worldwide.



Stepping Up

Growing disciples in places where life is tough



Stepping Up is the first step for a parish to be involved with the Mustard Seed Programme. It provides an opportunity for lay people to come together once a week with people from other parishes in their deanery to grow together as disciples of Jesus.

Who is it for?

- Does your parish want to grow in mission in your local community?
- Is your parish committed to developing lay people in mission?
- Are there are one or more people in your parish who have a desire to grow in their discipleship and sharing God's love in the local community?

What is Stepping Up?

- A learning community for lay people based in a local parish
- Meeting once a week during term time for a year
- The group will be small in size, people will learn and share together as they grow as disciples of Jesus
- Each session will last for 3-4 hours, and will include time for prayer, engaging with the bible, group reflection/examen on the past week, learning, sharing and eating together
- Learning will be experiential and reflective, using a range of resources to support learning in different styles, as well as written material
- Each week there will be a practical application from the learning for people to apply in their church/community
- Each person will have a journal to record their learning and development using a variety of ways e.g. written reflections, art, photos, poetry
- Everyone will have a personal mentor who will meet with them to support their personal development, and help them in contributing to group learning
- Each person will have the opportunity to identify their strengths and areas for growth
- People will grow in their confidence and ability to share their faith and explore how to develop mission in their community.

The Mustard Seed Vision

For many people life is tough, trying to do the best for themselves and their families, whilst struggling to make ends meet. In the Diocese of York this is particularly true for people living in areas with ‘multiple deprivations’ in Hull, Middlesbrough and our coastal communities, as well as smaller areas scattered across the Diocese. In these communities people face many challenges and that is why we want churches to be present, walking alongside people in the ups and downs of life. Providing places of welcome and support, reaching people with God’s love, creating opportunities to discover faith and growing disciples of Jesus.

World Day of Prayer 5th March 2021

Informed Prayer - Prayerful Action

The World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical, prayer movement initiated and carried out by Christian women in more than 180 countries and over 1000 languages. Every year Christians of many traditions and all ages, celebrate a common day of prayer on the first Friday in March all around the world, beginning in Tonga and New Zealand in the east and continuing throughout the day to Samoa and Alaska in the west. The needs of the world, and of the writing country in particular, are brought before Almighty God knowing that He will hear and answer us, as we pray in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. God invites us to have a prayer relationship with Himself, but He also expects us to have concerned relationships with our neighbours, throughout the world.



Prayer must be accompanied by action, as God moves our hearts and directs our thoughts. You may recall last year around 150 Christians belonging to many denominations gathered in St. Peter's for a lovely service written by the women of Zimbabwe followed by refreshments which included recipes from Zimbabwe.

This year the service comes from Vanuatu and the theme is:

"Building on a strong foundation"

They write the prayers and suggest the music (often written in their native language) which often is hard to replicate in our own churches!! But generally, we give it a go! "In the spirit of the 2021 WDP theme "Building on a Strong Foundation," WDPIC are glad to share an additional resource for the annual observance. WDPIC recorded a video of the worship service led by WDP Vanuatu and the WDPIC Executive Committee with greetings from several committees".

Can You Date the Photograph?

Chris Bowers recently submitted the photograph of the interior of St Peter's, but unfortunately it is not dated. We know the original box pews were removed in 1888 and the Lady Chapel extension was not built until 1926, so it must be somewhere between those two dates.

Chris writes " I have had a bit of a surf on the internet trying to find a date. The main thing I was working off was the 'RAPID CO' inscription at the bottom right of the image. There are a couple of Photographic companies with 'Rapid' in their name in operation prior to 1920's. Rapid Art Photography and Rapid Photographic Company, neither local. Both started work towards the end of the 1800's. My guess to the photograph's date is probably going to be around the early 1900's". Chris was wondering if there are still any marks on the floor near the font where the pulpit was—we'll be able to check when the church building re-opens soon.

I'm wondering where all the original church organ (and all those pipes!) went and if all the beautiful stained glass windows were re-instated at the East End when the Lady Chapel extension was built. Can anyone enlighten us?

NEWS FROM THE FRIENDS OF REDCAR CEMETERY

There are many people buried in the cemetery that have played a part in the life of Redcar over the years. This story is one that people may remember.

Pierrot shows originated in France, they arrived in England in 1891, making their debut at the Henley regatta. The shows were performed in the open air. By 1910 troupes were taking the shows on tour rather than remaining in one resort for the summer season. Shows flourished in the 1920s and the 1930s up until the Second World War. The Pierrots were very popular in Redcar. The troupe most remembered was Billy Scarrow's Optimists. He was a local lad and was born in Grangetown in 1899. His first performance was at a concert at the age of 8 and in his teens his family moved to Redcar. He enlisted to fight in WW1. After the war he toured all over the UK, before settling back in Redcar in the 1920s. Billy married Jennie in May 1925 and lived in Charlotte Street. The troupe worked hard and gave 3 performances a day. Many of the older residents of Redcar today remember them with warmth and affection. Mrs Ditchburn, a Redcar resident whose father managed the pitch remembered the tiger at the front near the drums being a mascot, because the drummer's signature tune was 'Tiger Rag.' She also remembered a feature of the show was a programme sold for a penny. Each one was numbered and during the show the lucky number was announced and a prize was awarded.

In the 1930s Billy became ill, but the troupe still worked and produced the same standard of entertainment. The outbreak of the war in 1939 altered the mood of the people, and together with a dispute regarding the cost of the pitch the troupe disbanded. During WW2, Billy worked for ENSA as an entertainer and manager. He carried out much charity work in hospitals and later became the secretary of the Redcar Workingmen's and Citizen's Clubs. Billy died in 1960 and is buried in the middle section of the cemetery.






